#### Mild Weather Affects Power Costs



The second component of the bill is the energy charge. This is the actual amount of kilowatt hours we purchase. In the winter months this value is typically higher since most customers use more energy to heat their homes. The rate we pay for each kilowatt is largely determined by the fuels used to generate electricity.

110 megawatts. For that, we were

charged around \$1.8 million.

Duke Energy uses a variety of generation resources to produce our electricity. Natural Gas, Diesel, Coal, Nuclear, Hydro, and Solar all play a role in our energy mix. Duke estimates how much all of these resources cost and that estimate is used to calculate our monthly energy charge, which leads us to the third component of our bill.



We are also charged a true-up energy charge. This charge is simply

rist, the weather has been rather mild this winter. In January, we saw 20 days where the high temperature was 54 degrees or higher. The average high temperature is 48 degrees. In December, we saw a similar pattern, with the last week of December reaching 65 degrees for highs. With these mild temperatures, it takes less energy for our members to keep their homes warm. This is obviously for all of us as customers, but how does that impact your electric cooperative?

French Broad EMC is billed monthly by Duke Energy for the energy we sell to our members. This one bill accounts for over 55% of our monthly expenses. There are several charges we pay on the bill regardless of how much energy we use. Facility charges, transmission services, communication fees and losses, just to name a few. However, there are three main components that make up the majority of our energy bill each month.

The largest of these three is the demand charge. In any given month, it can range from \$1.3 to over \$2 million dollars. This charge is determined by measuring our peak energy usage during the month, which in the winter, is typi-

the difference between the estimated energy cost and the actual cost. In the following month, the actual cost of the energy used is determined and then an adjustment is applied to the bill. If Duke Energy under estimated the fuel cost, then we have to pay an additional amount. Likewise, if they over estimated the cost, then we are credited back the difference. This charge can vary greatly from month to month. In fact, in February of 2015, we received a credit of over \$115 thousand dollars. The next month, March 2015, we were billed a true up charge of over \$900 thousand dollars.

These large swings in power costs can make it difficult to budget and manage revenue. Fortunately, our members' monthly bills are not subject to these large variances. Of course, we all see energy usage go up as the temperatures drop due to increased usage, but our Board of Directors has tried to insulate our members from large swings with our residential rate design.

Even though our revenues are down due to the mild winter temperatures, we are still able to manage the system costs due to an overall lower wholesale bill. In the long run, things seem to equal out and we collect enough revenue to make sure we meet the Rural Utility Service (RUS) requirements. And since we are a non-profit cooperative, any excess revenue goes back to our membership, just as it should.
